MESSAGE FROM MR PINKNEY



Another very busy half term at FBEC. Ironically, this is the last time I will probably use the old name as we prepare to become Ferryhill School from September 2022. I am sure you will agree that our new badge and tie look very smart and will, along with the new logo and signage for the school, give us a very clear and focussed image for the new academic year.

We are also updating and changing the physical structure of the school. Over the next few months we will be completely rebuilding the offices and reception, building new classrooms, toilets and decorating and upgrading classrooms. Many of the changes are a result of the increasing numbers of children we are attracting to FBEC. Next year we will have over 850 students in school, almost double the numbers 10 years ago.

We are currently in the middle of the first GCSE exams since 2019. The exam period this time is slightly longer and we still have three weeks of exams after the half term. I would like to thank all the Y11 students and their parents for all their support over the past few weeks. We are all very proud of the work and effort the students have put in and their conduct during the exam period. As a little reward, today, the students will be having Domino's pizza and a visit from the ice cream van to thank them for their efforts.

A big thanks to Mrs Picard and her team for the organisation and management of the exams (and the ordering of the ice cream). Mrs Clarke who has been our examinations officer for many years is retiring this year. A big thank you to her for her dedicated work over the years – exam results day will not be the same without her.

Also leaving us this year is Alan Ankers, a very valuable member of the premises team who leaves us after 14 years. Alan had a lovely send off by all the staff yesterday and we wish him and his wife a lovely retirement

On a negative note we continue to see some our students causing problems of anti-social behaviour in our villages. We are very active in working with the police, the local council and Durham County Council to support initiatives to reduce the impact of this. Some of the students involved have already been permanently excluded from the school. As a school we want our young people to be proud of their school and the community. 99% of our students are supportive of this, however those who do not support behaviour in school should expect consequences. This will include permanent exclusion.

Next half term FBEC is going global as we prepare to go on visits to Canada, The Seychelles and France. The trips which are funded through a bid successfully applied for by Mrs Johnson will see our students experiencing the culture and education of those countries. Thanks to Mr Handley and Mrs Johnson for their organisation of the visits.

Finally, I would like to wish all our students a very pleasant and relaxing holiday. I hope you all enjoy the Jubilee celebrations next week.
