
Well done to all students involved, their hard work in after school clubs with Miss Langdale really showed and is reflected in their success.

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RIDE ON PUBLIC ROADS? ARE E-SCOOTERS SAFE TO

- E-scooters can be very dangerous and are not designed for use on public roads
- a minor defect in the road could cau the rider to fall off the scooter
- E-scooter consist of a thin piece of user being inches from the road metal between two small tyres with
